The local countryside, easily accessible from Burderop Park, offers an enchanting mix of wild woodland, open fields and meandering waterways to discover.





### 1300s

Between 1305 and 1355 land belonging to the Cardeville family (including the land that is now Burderop Park) was given to Hyde Abbey and became known as Burderop Manor.

### 1500s

Thomas (II) Stephens purchased the manor of Burderop in 1561 and the main farmhouse became a manor house. Queen Elizabeth I stayed in Burderop manor in 1591 on the way to Down Ampney.

### 1600s

In 1619, Sir William Calley bought Chiseldon and Burderop manors and unified them as Burderop Estate: William (I) Calley made his fortune as an importer of silks, gold and silver and Seville oil. Upon his death the estate was passed down through the family and underwent a number of changes.

### 1700s

In 1731 the manor house went through a major re-build and was transformed into a Palladian building. The granary, walled garden and north wing were also constructed.

### 1800s

Between 1811-1831 Thomas Calley, who was then the High Sheriff of Wiltshire, held various race meetings at Burderop Park. In 1823 he was made bankrupt and in 1845 parts of the estate were sold off.

### 1900s

The Calleys continued to host the landed gentry and their great friend King Edward VII, who visited on several occasions. The last male direct line of the Calley family died in 1932 and the house was eventually left to a cousin, Sir Henry Calley of Overtown Manor.

The Halcrow family bought the house and 30 acres in 1977. The manor underwent a major renovation during this time alongside the construction of office space. Two pavilions were built in 1977 and another in 1990. During the renovation of the mansion, a number of wall paintings were found including the coat of arms of William (I) Calley.

### **Today**

Part of the original Burderop estate, Burderop Park is a new community for modern lifestyles, with a selection of contemporary home and a number of new facilities.

### An historic estate

### A special story that dates back hundreds of years.

Through the centuries the Burderop Estate has dramatically evolved from arable farming to a country residence to more recently, commercial space. The 18th century Palladian manor house famously designed by Francis Smith of Warwick still stands today.

The oldest surviving plan of 1773 shows the landscape gardens and lawn to the east of the house and the principal access route running south, with a second drive to the farm. Through the years parts of the estate were sold off but Burderop farm and Manor House remained.





Chiseldon is just two miles away where you'll find Three Trees Farm Shop and Café, ideal for perusing fresh local produce. Nearby Wichelstowe boasts a fantastic Waitrose, whilst slightly further afield you have the rural market town of Marlborough, with its fine selection of characterful shops and cafés. Pubs of course are a traditional focus of village life, and there are plenty to try along with a host of independent shops, boutiques and everyday essentials.

There's always something happening locally, with a variety of attractions and events throughout the year including the regular farmers market, the annual literature festival and international jazz festival.

In nearby Wroughton you'll find The Brown Jack, a traditional gastro pub that's the perfect place for casual dining with friends, while The Chiseldon House Hotel and Restaurant provides the ideal setting for Sunday lunch or afternoon tea with the family.

If you'd prefer to stay closer to home, you could grab a bite to eat at the local pub the Calley Arms in Hodson, which takes its name from the Calley family who once owned Burderop Park.





### Something for every style





From art exhibitions and theatrical events to museums and historical points of interest, Burderop Park is surrounded by a vibrant arts and culture scene. Swindon is also home to a lively arts scene with several exhibitions and events taking place throughout the year at various venues, such as the Wyvern Theatre and the Swindon Museum and Art Gallery. You can also be transported back in time with a visit to the ancient Barbury Castle, or simply sit back and watch the latest blockbuster movie in the multi-screen cinema in the town centre.

The North Wessex Downs (just a short drive away) has an array of walking, cycling and horse riding trails to discover. One of those reserves, Stonebridge in Marlborough, offers a wonderful day out for the entire family, with inspiring views of the River Kennet and the chance to spot rare species including heron and kingfisher.


### Well connected

Burderop Park is ideally located for work, rest or play. Travelling by car is simple, with the M4 corridor just over two miles away, providing easy access to Swindon, Bristol, Reading, London and Heathrow airport. What's more, Chippenham and Bristol are less than an hour away, and London can be reached in less than two hours via the M4.

For those times you need to travel by train, the popular commuter base of Swindon is less than five miles away and provides regular connections to key destinations including Cheltenham Spa, Bristol Temple Meads, and London Paddington.

There are also convenient bus stops located immediately outside Burderop Park, connecting to Chiseldon in 17 minutes and Swindon train station in 40 minutes.

The area offers a superb selection of schools that cater for all ages.

For younger families, there are a number of pre-schools and daycare facilities nearby, including Busy Bees Nursery and Wroughton Preschool.

Chiseldon Primary school, Wroughton Junior school and the Ridgeway school are all less than a 10-minute drive away and have a Good Ofsted rating, while the area is also very well served by private schools including Pinewood, Marlborough College, Radley College, St Mary's Calne, Dauntsey's and Downe House.

For those seeking higher education, the first-class universities and colleges in Oxford are approximately one hour away by car, whilst Bath and Bristol universities are also within easy reach.




